A HEALTHCARE PIPELINE PROGRAM FOR DC STUDENTS

The DC Health and Academic Prep Program (DC HAPP) is a pipeline program coordinated by the George Washington University School of Medicine and Health Sciences Office of Diversity and Inclusion to increase access to medical careers for students with identities underrepresented in medicine. A cohort of rising 11th-and 12th-grade students attending Washington, D.C. area public schools is selected to participate based on their passion for healthcare. Students attend a four-week summer experience and then participate in clinical shadowing.

DC HAPP scholars gain exposure to potential health care professions, learn hands-on medical skills, develop public health projects, and prepare for college applications and college life. Medical and public health students, physicians, and other medical professionals serve as mentors, facilitators, and teachers.

DC HAPP seeks to:

- Identify, recruit, and nurture talented District of Columbia area public school students from backgrounds underrepresented in medicine who have an interest in pursuing careers in the health professions
- Establish connections between students and health care professionals, including but not limited to physicians, physician assistants, nurses, physical therapists, and medical researchers
- Provide continuing support and resources for program scholars to achieve post-secondary academic success leading to professional careers in the health care field
- Build sustainable mentor/mentee relationships that aid scholars in long-term academic and professional success in the health care field

- Twelve scholars in the 2015 cohort enrolled in a post-secondary educational institution; one joined the Metropolitan Police Department of the District of Columbia
- Two scholars earned the Gates Millennium Scholarship
- Two scholars earned Posse scholarships
